30th Street Food Pantry

Every day, we work to ensure that everyone has access to healthy food and other essential services—such as basic medical care, diapers and transportation—to help our neighbors move toward greater self-sufficiency and well-being.

Volunteer Spotlight: Tom

Distribution Center: Where Generosity Meets Need

Our Distribution Center serves as a donation hub where we collect, sort and clean clothing, furniture and household items, preparing them for distribution to our neighbors in need.

Purchases at Mission 27 support SVdP Indy's food pantry and Changing Lives Forever program—that means every purchase helps fight hunger, promote self-sufficiency and break generational cycles of poverty.

Love Your Neighbor Center: Rebuilding Lives One at a Time

The Love Your Neighbor Center provides housing, programming and services for unsheltered individuals—as well as resources for employment, permanent housing, public assistance and financial literacy.

68% are employed 74% are housed 74% exited to a stable life



Resident Spotlight: Kevin

Kevin worked hard all his life, yet despite his continued effort, he was only making it paycheck to paycheck. A car accident took away his transportation and ability to earn a living, leaving Kevin without a place to live. He felt his life was hopeless—until he came to SVdP Indy's Love Your Neighbor Center (LYNC). He credits LYNC with helping him get healthy, learn life skills and rebuild his life.

Staff Spotlight: Connie

Connie was one of our first employees at Mission 27, hired two days before the first store opened in 2016. Connie was already familiar with SVdP Indy-she'd participated in



Changing Lives Forever, visited the 30th Street Food Pantry, and volunteered wherever help was needed—so working at one of our thrift stores seemed like the natural next step. Today, Connie is proud to be still working at Mission 27 in a jackof-all-trades role where she runs the register, helps customers, stocks inventory and works the dock when needed.

"Back then, I could not have imagined being where I am today," she says. "CLF turned my life around, and now I get to do work I enjoy in a fun environment that helps many people."

Kate came to SVdP Indy to give herself something to focus on while caring for her sick husband. Six years later, Kate now co-leads our children's area at the Distribution Center, spreading her passion to the many volunteers she's recruited to help her. The substantial needs in our community make her a champion for our Neighbors Services program.

District Spotlight: S. Central Indiana District

Volunteers and donors in the South Central Indiana District have made a significant impact across our communities. In Brown County, volunteers helped a client transition home after a hospital stay by adapting her apartment, while a food drive in Nashville brought in over a thousand pounds of food and a \$600 donation. In North Vernon, volunteers provided items to a neighbor in need and supported a young woman experiencing homelessness by offering interview clothing. These acts remind us of the power of community and the difference we can make together. As one grateful neighbor expressed, "You people are a real lifesaver."
