ABOUT 30 percent of the food we give away is provided by the USDA/TEFAP program. In spring 2025 we had to choose between keeping our zip-code boundaries or declining that food. We chose to give away more. This change and an uptick in food insecurity increased the number of people we served. We witnessed the adage, "God will provide." The outpouring of time, talent, and treasure from our supporters has been amazing. "Look at the birds in the sky. They do not sow or reap, they gather nothing into barns; yet your heavenly Father feeds them. Are not you more important than they?" (Matthew 6:26) Our work, our shoppers, and our supporters are important. So is our faith. **Thanks for your continued support!**

MAY/JUN

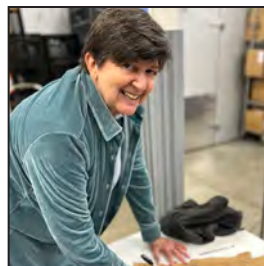


Bob White (left) and **Matt Hayes** were each Pantry directors during a year that included a surprise farewell fundraiser.

FY2025—BY THE NUMBERS



The ratio of donated food to purchased food rose to a 69/31 split.



Solar panels generated 30,439 kWh (67% of our electricity) saving \$3,519.



Pounds of food received: 602,715. Value of food donated was \$1.92/pound.



Pounds of food donated from STA, SJOA, CTK, StL, and IHM: 62,228—up 12%.
